


The community is invited to be part of Trumbull County Reads 2023 this October as local libraries join together for a shared reading and learning experience.


Trumbull County Reads (formerly known as One Book/One Community) is an annual initiative that encourages everyone to celebrate reading through conversations and events related to a central book or topic.

This year, four books - selected for children through adults - that focus on the theme "Stand Up" will be featured:




CHILDREN'S SELECTION


TWEEN SELECTION
Anthem by Deborah Wiles

From two-time National Book Award finalist Deborah Wiles, the remarkable story of two cousins who must take a road trip across America in 1969 in order to let a teen know he's been drafted to fight in Vietnam. Full of photos, music, and figures of the time, this is the masterful story of what it's like to be young and American in troubled times.

Kent State: Four Dead in Ohio
by Derf Backderf

From author Derf Backderf comes the tragic and unforgettable story of the Kent State shootings, told in graphic novel form. Backderf takes us back to the age of the Vietnam War, Richard Nixon, Woodstock, and the Cold War and explores, in words and images, a scene of tragedy, the campus of Kent State University, where National Guard Troops attacked unarmed protestors and killed four students (Allison Beth Krause, age 19, Jeffrey Glenn Miller, age 20, Sandra Lee Scheuer, age 20, and William Knox Schroeder, age 19).

GUEST SPEAKERS

Culture/Counterculture with the Kent State University Fashion Museum

Culture/Counterculture looks at fashions of the 1960s and early 1970s with a particular focus on the generation gap during that period. The presentation relates to the recent exhibition at the Kent State University Museum which was scheduled to coincide with the 50th anniversary of Kent State's shootings on May 4, 1970. The shootings of Kent State University students by the Ohio National Guard brought to a head the cultural divides that had split the nation. There was a sharp contrast between supporters of the establishment and those opposed – the culture and the counterculture. These social and political cleavages in society saw their clear expression in the fashions of the time. The presentation will showcase images of pieces drawn from the rich holdings of the university's historic costume collection.

"Why Didn't the Students Leave the Commons When They Were Ordered to Do So?" The Kent State Shootings

Kent State University professors Laura Davis and Mark Seeman—each closely connected to and deeply knowledgeable about the Kent State shootings—will delve into essential questions that continue to be asked 53 years after May 4, 1970. "Why did the guardsmen shoot?" The backdrop of the Sixties (that is, 1954 to 1975) helps us understand. "What do we know, and how do we know it?" Key facts explain. "Why didn't students leave the Commons when they were ordered to do so?" Our discussion will seek to provide the answer.

She is an NAACP Book Award finalist, E.B. White Award winner, Golden Kite Award winner, Jane Addams Peace Award Finalist, and recipient of a PEN Phyllis Reynolds Naylor Working Writer Fellowship.




The History of the World (April 1969 – May 1970)

The History of the World (April 1969-May 1970); (PBS, 2017). Rated TV-MA [Language/Violence]. Runtime 109 minutes) Episode 8 of *The Vietnam War: A Film by Ken Burns & Lynn Novick*. With morale plummeting in Vietnam, President Nixon begins withdrawing American troops. As news breaks of an unthinkable massacre committed by American soldiers, the public debates the rectitude of the war. Snacks will be served at the movie showing and a trivia sheet offered for a chance to win a prize.

The Last Full Measure

The Last Full Measure (Lions Gate Films, Inc., 2019). Rated R [War Violence and Language]. Runtime 116 minutes.) This film chronicles the true story of William H. Pitsenbarger (from Piqua, Ohio), a U.S. Air Force medic who personally saved over sixty men before making the ultimate sacrifice in Vietnam's bloodiest battle. Three decades later, Pentagon staffer Scott Huffman investigates a Congressional Medal of Honor request made by Pitsenbarger's mission partner and parents. Huffman interviews Army veterans to learn more about Pitsenbarger's courageous acts — and uncovers a high-level conspiracy behind the medal's denial. A brief, optional discussion will follow the movie.
